

From the Editor



Welcome to our Autumn Newsletter for 2021.

As I put this edition to bed we are experiencing problems with the delivery of fuel at a rate to replace the fuel purchased by all drivers following warnings of a shortage. It was these very warnings which resulted in panic buying by large numbers of motorists and so the warnings of a shortage became self-fulfilling as the percentage of motorists driving with full tanks soared to record heights.

As I rode my motorcycle to it's annual appointment for a MOT test I was passing long queues waiting to enter fuel stations. One queue when I returned had gone completely but this was only due to the service station running dry and closing until they received their next delivery. Because the bike is fifteen years old and relies on carburettors instead of fuel injection I will now be using super grade petrol which is E5 (5% ethanol) to avoid any problems with the E10 (10% ethanol) fuel which is now in the pumps as standard as part of this government's attempts to be greener and which is degrading the rubber items in older fuel systems. I hope that all members with older vehicles are aware of the potential problems and have checked the suitability for their vehicle. I hope that our members managed to obtain the fuel that they needed in these trying times and that things are back to some sort of normal before our Observer Training Day which, for me, is a 98 mile round trip before we even start on training runs. Our last full scale training day was a full two years ago because of Covid, and I would hate to have to miss the next due to fuel shortages.

For my wife Karen's birthday we went to spend a few nights in London and to catch a show. We decided to travel up by coach and rely on TfL whilst in the city. I was once again surprised at how much more you notice when you can look around and ignore the need to concentrate on the driving or the observing. The buildings, people and street furniture become items to be taken in for their own points of interest instead of just registering as a hazard which you are aware of but not the full detail because you are already looking for next hazard.

I was pleased to be able to attend the meeting where we said goodbye to Sally and Gary, as they both move right away from our area, and to thank them for all they had done for CSAM and Chichester Group before that. I also passed on the good wishes of those who had contacted me with messages because they were unable to attend.

It has been great to get back into the passenger seat observing once more and enjoying the Sunday mornings driving in and around what the South Downs has to offer and facing the old and some of the new challenges that have appeared on the road with the increased number of vehicles of road users. The satisfaction from the first drive with your associate, watching the improvement to some of the last drives before the test where it is a pleasure to be the passenger and they are also picking up areas of improvement is so rewarding. It is great to see associates taking their advanced test and becoming full members and it will also be great when more of the social aspects of this group can happen again.

How are you finding the roads? Although busier I feel the volume of traffic on the roads has become more predictable and the usual rush hours previously experienced are starting to return. Most drivers seem more confident behind the wheels once more but I still see the impatience on the road and a lot more pulling out of side streets without concern of the approaching driver or the traffic behind them. My advance driving skills certainly helped the other day approaching a mini roundabout in Worthing and noticed the car approaching from my first exit had not made eye contact or altered speed. I am so grateful for the notion of "planning to stop, looking to go" as I was able to stop and wait for them to drive straight over and continue their journey.

With a new Highway Code expected later this year and the new E10 petrol at the pumps there are a number of changes happening on the roads to keep up to date with. The update to the Highway Code will be the first changes in a decade which will see pedestrians and cyclists have higher priority on the road over cars and motorbikes. It is worth saying that not all petrol cars will be able to use the new fuel but there is helpful guidance on gov.uk. I did like the disclaimer that "This only applies to petrol vehicles. Diesel and electric vehicles cannot use E10 petrol". I guess we all take for granted what we know as advanced drivers but I would certainly check compatibility if you are unsure, especially if you have a classic car.

I have really enjoyed my time as membership secretary, and gain great satisfaction supporting members developing their driving skills. Members that have passed their advanced driving test, I really recommend you think about becoming a Fellow. It is so easy for bad habits to sneak back into driving and the opportunity to re-sit your advanced driving test every three years ensures that you maintain your advanced driving to a high standard. Those that are looking to push themselves further and obtain the highest civilian standard, I cannot recommend the Masters enough. It was one of the most challenging but rewarding experiences I have done behind the wheel. Achieving a Masters Distinction in my 5 year retest at the end of 2019 was one of the proudest moments as a driver. I obtained my advanced test on 14th March 2019, but it was CSAM that truly developed me into the driver I am today. Unfortunately this will be the last newsletter I write as membership secretary of the group as I will be standing down at the AGM. With a second child due in November and the pressures at work, I need to take a back seat for a few years but will be involved in the group as an observer and will be willing to take on committee roles in the future when I have more capacity again. Hopefully I will see many of you at the AGM and at future events held by CSAM

#### Associates' News



We Now that restrictions have officially ended, Observed Runs have restarted in earnest and several Associates are close to Test Ready with two already passing with a F1rst.

#### GB stickers no longer valid for driving abroad

Drivers travelling abroad will have to display UK stickers instead of GB ones

Anyone taking their car abroad will have to display a UK sticker rather than a GB one. The change is rumoured to be a sign of solidarity with Northern Ireland from Westminster in the face of post-Brexit trade tensions.

The GB sticker has been in use for 111 years, but while it is technically valid for Northern Irish cars taken abroad, that country is not part of the geographical island of Great Britain, a detail that has irked some Northern Irish residents over the years.

But in the face of issues such as the 'sausage wars', the UK Government has written to the United Nations to effect the change, stating: "The United Kingdom is changing the distinguishing sign that it had previously selected for display in international traffic on vehicles registered in the United Kingdom, from "GB" to "UK"...this change took effect on 28 September 2021."

The switch from GB to UK stickers comes just months after ministers unveiled a new GB number plate with a Union Flag. This replaced the previous 'Euro' plate, which showed the stars of the European Union with the letters GB.

But the switch to UK signifiers, while being inclusive of Northern Ireland, means drivers with the new GB plates will have to either change their plates, or affix an additional UK sticker to their cars from September.

Unlike the now invalid GB plates, which were heralded by Transport Secretary Grant Shapps in January, the switch to UK signifiers was not formally announced by the Government. Instead it was spotted as a footnote in UN regulations by the AA, which says it has 50,000 items of stock it will now need to change.

Current rules for flags, symbols and identifiers

You can display one of the following flags with identifying letters on the left-hand side of the number plate:

Union flag (also known as the Union Jack)

Cross of St George

Cross of St Andrew - also known as the Saltire

Red Dragon of Wales

The letters, or national identifiers, you can have are:

UNITED KINGDOM, United Kingdom or UK

GREAT BRITAIN, Great Britain or GB

CYMRU, Cymru, CYM or Cym

ENGLAND, England, ENG, Eng

SCOTLAND, Scotland, SCO or Sco

**WALES** or Wales

The flag must be above the identifier. You cannot have the flag or letters on the number plate margin, and neither can be more than 50 millimetres wide.

Driving outside the UK

If your number plate includes the UK identifier with the Union flag (also known as the Union Jack), you do not need a UK sticker.

However, you will need to display a UK sticker clearly on the rear of your vehicle if your number plate has any of the following:

- a GB identifier with the Union flag
- a Euro symbol
- a national flag of England, Scotland or Wales

numbers and letters only - no flag or identifier

If you're in Spain, Cyprus or Malta, you must display a UK sticker no matter what is on your number plate.

If you have a GB sticker, cover or remove it before driving outside the UK.

You do not need a UK sticker or number plate to drive in Ireland.

## For Members Who Tow, Changes to the Law on Towing, New rules for towing a trailer or caravan with a car from autumn 2021

What you're currently allowed to tow

Licences issued before 1 January 1997

You will not be affected by the changes if you passed your car driving test before 1 January 1997.

You're usually allowed to drive a vehicle and trailer combination up to 8,250kg maximum authorised mass (MAM). View your driving licence information to check.

You're also allowed to drive a minibus with a trailer over 750kg MAM.

MAM is the limit on how much the vehicle can weigh when it's loaded.

Licences issued from 1 January 1997 to 18 January 2013

If you passed your car driving test from 1 January 1997 to 18 January 2013, you can currently drive either of the following:

a car or van up to 3,500kg MAM towing a trailer of up to 750kg MAM (up to 4,250kg in total)

a trailer over 750kg MAM, as long as it is no more than the unladen weight of the towing vehicle (up to 3,500kg in total)

You've had to pass a car and trailer driving test if you want to tow anything heavier.

Licences issued from 19 January 2013

If you passed your car driving test from 19 January 2013, you can currently drive either of the following:

a car or van up to 3,500kg MAM towing a trailer of up to 750kg MAM (up to 4,250kg in total)

a trailer over 750kg MAM as long as the combined MAM of the trailer and towing vehicle is no more than 3,500kg

You've had to pass a car and trailer driving test if you want to tow anything heavier.

What will change later in 2021

If you passed your car driving test from 1 January 1997, you'll be allowed to tow trailers up to 3,500kg MAM when the law changes.

DVLA will update your driving licence record to show that you're allowed to tow trailers. You'll get category BE added to your driving licence when you get a new photocard driving licence.

You do not need to contact DVLA for this to happen. It will be done automatically.

The date the law will change has not yet been confirmed. Sign up for email alerts to be told when the law changes.

Car and trailer driving tests stopping from 20 September 2021

Car and trailer driving tests are stopping before the law changes.

You can no longer book or take a car and trailer driving test from 20 September 2021. However, the law will not change until later in 2021.

What you can do until the law changes

Until the law changes later in autumn 2021, you must continue to follow the current rules about what you're allowed to tow based on when you passed your car driving test.

You can be fined up to £1,000, be banned from driving and get up to 6 penalty points on your driving licence if you tow anything heavier before the law changes.

You're only allowed to tow anything heavier if you're being supervised. When you're being supervised, you must:

display L plates to the front of the car and the rear of the trailer

be accompanied by a person who's at least 21 years old and has had category BE on their driving licence for at least 3 years.

Driving a car and trailer for the first time

It's best to take training from a driving instructor if you want to start driving a car and trailer.

The 'National standard for driving cars and light vans' tells you about the skills, knowledge and understanding you need to tow a trailer or caravan.

You can also read about why learning to tow is important and safety checks you should do when you're towing a trailer or caravan with a car

If you'd booked a car and trailer driving test

Your car and trailer driving test will not go ahead if it was due to take place on or after 20 September 2021.

If you booked the test yourself, the Driver and Vehicle Standards Agency has automatically cancelled it for you. You'll get a full refund within 5 working days.

If your driving instructor booked your test for you, talk to them about what happens next.

You cannot get a refund or compensation for any training that you've taken to help you prepare to take the test.

If you had previously passed a car and trailer driving test

You cannot get a refund or compensation for any training that you took to help you prepare to take a car and trailer driving test. You also cannot get a refund for any tests you took.

When I semi-retired a couple of years ago I decided that I'd like to do some charity work, and I wanted to give something back to my local community. I enjoy driving, and helping people, so what better way to combine these by volunteering as a minibus driver.

Guild Care, a charity local to me in Worthing, discussed the role with me first. I was keen to proceed so a quick driving assessment was next, with my IAM skills to the fore luckily I passed, and I've been driving for them ever since, usually a couple of times a week. The beauty of this role is that I'm not committed to a fixed shift or fixed number of hours, they are extremely flexible and of course very grateful for any time I can give. If I want to go away on holiday, no problem.

It's hugely rewarding, the clients now know me and give me a big smile. It's fantastic to think that this charity provides a day care centre for the elderly who would otherwise live "home alone", and a specialist day care centre for dementia patients to give their carers some respite. And other services too.

So that's my role, to pick up clients from their home\* in the minibus and drop them to the day centre, or back again. Each shift is up to 2 hours max.
