From the Editor

I recently drove from Bradford to Bangor in North Wales. On the way I stopped at the National Trust Bodnant Gardens to meet up with one of my university colleagues for a quick lunch before we went on to Bangor for an engineering talk and dinner and meeting up with other friends who also studied at the university. The whole journey was just under 300 miles taking roughly 2½ hours each way finally arriving home just after midnight. The trip computer in the car showed about 150 miles left in the tank the following morning so plenty for the daily trips to take my grandson to school for the rest of the week.

It set me thinking what would the same journey be like in an electric car? If we say a typical range of an electric car is 300 miles (on a good day!) It would seem that my journey would be possible... but would it? Assume I start with a fully charged car i.e. charged to 100% although it is not recommended to regularly charge to that level in order to preserve the battery life. It's also not recommended to drop below 20%, again to preserve the battery life. So I'd only have a range of around 240 miles. Also most of the journey would be on motorways or dual carriageways meaning little chance of topping up the charge through regeneration. So I'd have to charge up somewhere en route.

At Bodnant I spotted two charge points, fine but both were occupied and we didn't want to stay long there, just time for a quick snack as we wanted to get to Bangor for an exhibition starting at 1pm. There would have been no problem getting to Bangor but I would then have to have found a charge point. No problem leaving it to charge up as the intention was to leave the car at the dinner venue and walk to the exhibition which was in another part of the university. Where we parked there were a couple of charge points but once again they were occupied. I think the university has a number of electric vehicles so these may not have been available to visitors. So the problem would have been to find a charge point, leave the car and collect it after an hour or so or leave it occupying the charger until late evening. Or I could have set off and found a charger on the way back home but that would have meant probably arriving home well after 1am.

The charging infrastructure has a long way to go so I'll be sticking with my petrol car as long as I can.

Directions to the Birkenshaw Liberal Club

10 Croft Street, Birkenshaw, Bradford, BD11 2HT









From the M62 West leave at Junction 26 and take the A58 towards Leeds. At the second roundabout turn left into Bradford Road (A651) after about 700yds by the George pub, turn right into Town Street. Croft Street is approximately 60yds from the junction (top photo left) but to avoid the potholes carry on up Town Street and turn right into Old Lane. After approximately 100yds turn right into Croft Street (middle picture left between the car and the house next to it).

From Bradford follow the A650. Turn right onto the A651 at the traffic lights just before Tong Academy. Then just after the George pub turn left into Town Street and follow the previous directions.

From the M62 junction 27, take the A650. Turn left onto the A58. After approximately ½ mile turn right into Old Lane After approximately 550yds turn left into Croft Street (bottom picture left).

There is a large car park and the entrance is down the right hand side of the club as shown in the top picture.

Our meetings are held in the function room.

March Meeting The Wright Will Company

For out March social meeting we welcomed back Alison Wright who runs The Wright Will Company after having worked in a law firm for several years.

Alison first covered what happens if you die without making a will and are declared intestate. You may have assumed that your estate would go to your partner but this is not always the case. The law dictates who can inherit your estate which can often be difficult. If you have ever watched any of the Heir Hunters programmes on TV you will see how specialist firms will trace, or try to trace, anyone who is legally entitled to inherit your estate. If no one can be found, your estate will go to the government. Therefore it is important to make a will.

Alison also covered making preparations in case you have to go into care and how to set up a Discretionary Trust to ensure your estate will benefit the people you want it to benefit. She mentioned several cases where people had been advised to set up a trust will by various companies who had appointed themselves as one of the Trustees. When these companies had sold their businesses to other companies these other companies became trustees and in many cases were difficult to deal with when people had died, making it very difficult, for example, to sell a house. Her advice was to be careful about who you appoint as trustees, your spouse and possibly your children were suggested. (Caroline and I have made our wills appointing each other and our children as trustees)

Finally Alison explained what Lasting Powers of Attorney (LPA) were and why you should set one up. There are two types covering Health and Finance. While you are healthy you are able to deal with all aspects of your health and financial affairs but should you lose the mental capacity decisions on your health and finance would be made by "professionals" which may not be in accordance with your wishes. Having an LPA means that decisions would be made by people you have appointed who would enact your wishes which may be different to the decisions professionals would make.

Alison gave us several useful pieces of advice.

1. Never appoint a legal professional as an Executor as they will charge for their services and can take a percentage of your estate.

- 2. They will also offer to look after your will but will charge for looking after it. You are perfectly entitled to store your own will and any LPAs but let your executors know where they are stored.
- 3. Talk to your relatives about how you would like them to act should an LPA have to be used.

I also have a few notes to add based on dealing with my mother's estate 10 years ago. She had been a probate clerk in a firm of solicitors and had written her own will appointing myself and my brother as executors. (Here's an interesting fact, your will needs to be witnessed but anyone who acts as a witness cannot be a beneficiary of your will). We found that the various authorities we had to deal with were most helpful and guided us through the whole process along with the notes my mother had written. The only thing her notes didn't cover was transferring her house into our names but a call to the Land Registry explained which forms needed to be filled in and after a visit to the local Land Registry office we were owners of the house for a cost of £62 (2013 prices). My brother reckoned that we probably saved around £5,000 by doing it all ourselves.

It's also worth drawing up a list of your bank accounts and other financial institutions to help your executors.

Alison handed out a set of notes covering the topics in her talk. If anyone would like a copy let me know and I'll email you a copy.

Record Price for a Ford Sierra



You don't happen to have Ford Sierra sitting in your garage doing nothing? One sold recently at auction for a record price. OK it wasn't your average run of the mill Sierra but one of only 500 Sierra Cosworth RS500s built.

Back in 1987 it cost £19,950 new but this rare example, with only 5192 miles on the clock, sold for a record price of £596,250 at a recent auction. It came with a number of rare spares including a set of RS500 wheels.

Of the 500 produced 392 were in black, including the one sold at auction, with 52 in blue and 56 in white.

Caravan for Sale

You are probably aware that MYAM has a caravan that we used to promote the Group and the IAM at the various events we attended. Since the pandemic we have not been able to attend any of these events and the caravan has been in storage since our last event in September 2019.

Air Quality

It would appear that a new source of vehicle pollution has been "discovered" which affects all vehicles both ICE and electric. In fact electric vehicles can produce a greater level of this pollution than ICE vehicles.

If we look back at the various efforts to reduce air pollution over the last 70 or so years the air we breathe has improved immeasurably. The days of smog lingering over towns and cities from the many coal fires are long gone due to the various Clean Air acts. Once this source had been reduced other sources came to light but as each of these has been reduced through the various Acts of Parliament other sources at an even lower level have been discovered. Of course it doesn't help that many of our towns and cities were not built with air quality in mind. They were built where it was convenient such as crossing points over rivers.

Many towns and cities have Ultra Low Emission Zones (ULEZ) but now they are finding another source of air pollution - particles from tyres. As your tyres wear down the rubber compound is released into the air as very small particles. Electric cars can be worse for this form of air pollution as they are heavier and can wear out their tyres faster than petrol or diesel cars. They can also wear out the road surface faster.

You may also be aware that the London ULEZ has recently been extended to cover most of London. This has, to say the least, annoyed many owners of small businesses who have to cross the ULEZ boundary as part of their work. One small business owner who lives near the border of the expanded zone and who changed from working in central London to working in his local area when the ULEZ first came in, has started walking around near the ULEZ cameras with a number plate on his back in order to trip the cameras and cause more work for TfL by triggering a fine which would then have to be rescinded on review!

There are also several instances of the cameras having their cables cut or hoods placed over them.

Air Quality - 2

Much recent legislation has been aimed at improving the quality of the air we breathe but until now little has been done to improve the air quality inside cars and other vehicles. Following studies by several leading universities, the EU is introducing legislation aimed at improving the air quality inside cars, busses and other forms of public transport.

The proposals will require the air inside a vehicle to be passed through a **F**ume and **A**romatics **R**e**T**ention **S**ystem which will remove any pollutants in the air. These will be stored in a filter in the system and in a petrol or diesel vehicle the fumes will be drawn into the air intake to the engine to be burnt. In an electric vehicle the filter containing the stored pollutants will need to be periodically replaced.

The legislation is currently going through its final stages and the Fume and Aromatics ReTention System is expected to be made compulsory on cars manufactured after 1st April 2026 and on busses and trains from 1st April 2028.
