Directions to the Birkenshaw Liberal Club

10 Croft Street, Birkenshaw, Bradford, BD11 2HT









From the M62 West leave at Junction 26 and take the A58 towards Leeds. At the second roundabout turn left into Bradford Road (A651) after about 700yds by the George pub, turn right into Town Street. Croft Street is approximately 60yds from the junction (top photo left) but to avoid the potholes carry on up Town Street and turn right into Old Lane. After approximately 100yds turn right into Croft Street (middle picture left between the car and the house next to it).

From Bradford follow the A650. Turn right onto the A651 at the traffic lights just before Tong Academy. Then just after the George pub turn left into Town Street and follow the previous directions.

From the M62 junction 27, take the A650. Turn left onto the A58. After approximately ½ mile turn right into Old Lane After approximately 550yds turn left into Croft Street (bottom picture left).

There is a large car park and the entrance is down the right hand side of the club as shown in the top picture.

Our meetings are held in the function room.

March Meeting -

Richard Gladman AMR Chief Examiner

Back in October 2016 Richard Gladman, the IAM chief examiner, was our speaker when he gave us an update on what was happening at IAM headquarters. This time he told us more about himself and his role within the IAM.

Starting his driving career as an Advanced Police Driver and motorcyclist he progressed to a Roads Policing Senior Investigating officer and an instructor at the Metropolitan Police driving school.

He became an IAM examiner and eventually Head of Driving Standards at the IAM and he revealed that he was really a go-kart racing petrol head!

An Austin Allegro was his first police car and by the time he became a "proper" advanced driver he was driving an SD1 Rover. However the most popular police vehicle was the humble Ford Transit.

As a traffic sergeant he investigated accidents involving police vehicles and to improve his knowledge became an ADI which was a steep learning curve.

Then to the issue of Smart motorways. His personal view was that he liked the hard shoulder as if you break down on a smart motorway the technology that is supposed to detect your break down will only detect you if it is working correctly and there have been several instances where this technology has failed.

The IAM is lobbying for additional safe areas to be introduced nearer to the original spacing of 500 – 800 metres on the original trial on the M42.

Then to safer driving stating that when driving or riding we need a plan of action to ensure we remain safe on the road. His slide showed OAP, not a pensioner but Observe, Anticipate, Plan.

He then showed an interesting video of a road junction in India. There were no traffic signals and it looked chaotic with traffic turning into a side road in front of approaching vehicles and pedestrians crossing through the traffic but there were no incidents, the traffic approaching the junction seemed to anticipate the vehicles turning in front of them and pedestrians were safe as long as the kept moving. If they stopped then they were in danger! Would this way of traffic management work in this country?

There was then a short question and answer session after which Richard offered to meet the observers at a dedicated meeting. I'm sure we will be taking up his offer.

Meet The Committee

Janice Haigh, Chairman



I always wanted to learn to drive and passed my DVSA driving test in May, 1966, (when I was very young!!!)

In 1971, following a furious argument with my father about our standards of driving, I decided to take the IAM test – just to prove a point. I didn't know anything about local IAM Groups at that time, and so I contacted the ADI who had originally taught me to drive. As I didn't have a car of my own at the time, I had to use my instructor's vehicle for the runs and wasn't able to get a

great of practice. However, I succeeded in passing the IAM test in October, 1971 - first time!

Following this, I joined the Leeds Group of the IAM, but, owing to the nature of my job (which involved considerable overseas travel), I was not able to attend regular meetings. I therefore let my Group membership lapse, but always remained a Member of the IAM. This served me very well, as in those days I drove approximately 40,000 miles per year in the U.K. and all over the world.

In the summer of 2000, I was in Wakefield and saw that the Wakefield Advanced Motorists (WAM) Group had a stand at an event in the city centre. Early that year, I had been forced to give up my job in export, as my husband had suffered a major stroke and was in hospital for 18 months. As a result, I had some time on my hands in the evenings (after hospital visiting hours), and so I joined the Group and volunteered for the Committee as Minutes Secretary. In approximately 2008, I was elected Chairman of WAM, and remained in that post until MYAM was formed in approximately 2014. As I was by now on my own and enjoying travelling, I resigned from the Group, but still remained a Member of the IAM.

Between 2012 and 2016, I travelled the world, driving in many countries and in a variety of vehicles. I drove cars in Australia, New Zealand, and even the Bahamas - and then I drove a camper most of the way across Canada. I loved every minute!!

Then, in 2017, several members of the MYAM Committee contacted me. The Chairman, Secretary, and Chief Observer were standing down, and I was asked to re-join the Group and stand for the post of Chairman. I agreed – and the rest (as they say) is history!!!

Since then, I am proud to say that the Group has flourished, thanks to a very hard-working and loyal committee, which continued to operate during the pandemic. As my personal background was in export sales and marketing, I have thoroughly enjoyed being the "front man" for the Group, encouraging people of all ages to improve their driving skills and join IAMR.

Hi! My name is Alan Jones, and I am the Events Co-ordinator on the MYAM committee.

I have always loved driving and riding, and started out by passing my motorbike test in 1967. Following that, I took my car driving test (at Heckmondwike) in 1969, and, again, passed first time!

Sometime later, in 1980, I took my PSV (Public Service Vehicle) test, and started working as a driver for a local coach company. I also worked part

time for Wallace Arnold, and these jobs took me all over the U.K. and onto the Continent.

In 1987, I took my HGV (Heavy Goods Vehicle) test and started driving for British Gas delivering LPG in a tanker. This work also took me all over the U.K. until I was forced to retire in 2007 owing to ill health.

Early in my driving career, I had heard about the IAM and had always wanted to take the test. But I was unable to find anything about it. (There were no computers in those days.)

Then, in September 2003, whilst working as an HGV driver, I was shopping in Wakefield one Saturday. As I walked round a corner, I saw a caravan with "IAM" painted on the side. It was owned by Wakefield Advanced Motorists, so I went and asked about joining and signed up to do the course straightaway. I had twelve lessons with an Observer, and passed my test first time on the 4th January, 2004.

When I went to tell the Wakefield Group Membership Secretary, Derek Duffield, that I had passed my test, he replied: "Oh, good! You can be an Observer, and there's your new Associate"! I was really thrown in at the deep end! I remained an Observer until 2023, when I retired.

Shortly after passing the test, I joined the committee of the Wakefield Group and became the Observer/Associate Liaison. My job was to allocate Associates to the Observers.

I remained on the Group committee when MYAM was formed, and I am now the Events Coordinator. My job is to liaise and co-ordinate with the various car shows we attend during the summer months. As I also keep the attendance book and ensure that everyone signs in at the meetings, I am one of the first people you see when you arrive.

IAM RoadSmart responds to today's (19th March 2024) report by the AIA (Asphalt Industry Alliance)

IAM RoadSmart Director of Policy and Standards Nicholas Lyes said: "The AIA's report lays bare the crumbling state of our road network as well as the effort and money now needed to fix it. Notwithstanding the financial headache pothole-related damage does to the vehicle's owner, our crater-laden roads are posing a serious road safety hazard. In 2022 alone, nearly 500 collisions were caused by poor or defective surfaces, resulting in four fatalities. Recent IAM RoadSmart research shows that 82% of motorists have steered away or had to brake hard to try and avoid damage from a pothole in the last 12 months. This worrying finding suggests drivers are being forced to spend a great deal of their time focused on spotting holes in the tarmac rather than monitoring all hazards around them."

End Of The Manual? Young Drivers Opt For Automatics In Tests

Learner drivers are opting for automatic cars during their driving tests in greater numbers than ever before, heralding the demise of the manual gearbox.

Driving tests in automatic vehicles have risen to a record high, with 324,000 automatic-only tests being taken last year, according to official figures.

This is an increase of a third since 2022 and is the highest figure on record for the number of automatic transmission driving tests.

Tests taken in automatic cars made up more than a third of all the 865,000 driver qualification checks carried out last year, figures from the Driver and Vehicle Standards Agency (DVSA) revealed.

More drivers failed their tests in automatic cars than in manuals, however, with 48 per cent of learners in manual cars passing versus 43 per cent of candidates in automatics.
