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Cover Photo - Ravenglass and Eskdale Railway

Built originally in 1875 as a 3ft gauge railway to transport iron ore to the mainline station at Ravenglass. It was rebuilt as a 15" gauge in 1915. Its ownership changed hands until it was taken over by the Ravenglass and Eskdale Preservation Society and now operates as a visitor attraction running between Ravenglass and Dalgarth.

From the M62 West leave at Junction 26 and take the A58 towards Leeds. At the second roundabout turn left into Bradford Road (A651) after about 700yds by the George pub, turn right into Town Street. Croft Street is approximately 60yds from the junction (top photo left) but to avoid the potholes carry on up Town Street and turn right into Old Lane. After approximately 100yds turn right into Croft Street (middle picture left between the car and the house next to it).

From Bradford follow the A650. Turn right onto the A651 at the traffic lights just before Tong Academy. Then just after the George pub turn left into Town Street and follow the previous directions.

From the M62 junction 27, take the A650. Turn left onto the A58. After approximately ½ mile turn right into Old Lane. After approximately 550yds turn left into Croft Street (bottom picture left).

There is a large car park and the entrance is down the right hand side of the club as shown in the top picture.

March Meeting Phill Shaw IAM Examiner

This is a first for me, speaking to a group, so I'm not sure how long I can talk for. So said IAM examiner Phill Shaw at the start of our March meeting.

Many people are nervous at the start of their test, quite understandable, so he allows time for them to settle down. He also gave us a few tips which may help associates prepare for their test which are not necessarily directly to do with their driving. One example being having a clean and tidy car for the test which shows you care about your car and, hopefully your driving.

Knowing your car is also important and how any driver aids fitted work although you are not obliged to use them on a test. He is in favour of, and does use, driver aids but it is important to know when is best to use



them and any limitations they have. One aid which can help with "seeing" the road ahead is Sat nav as it can show upcoming bends even if it isn't being used for directions.

He also suggested that if you are stationary for more than 3 seconds you should apply the handbrake (How often have you been dazzled by the brake lights of the stationary car in front of you?)

On motorways many people struggle entering and exiting and understanding the speed limits applicable to some vehicles such as HGVs.

He also said that West Yorkshire Police were "allowing" 10% on speed limits rather that the often quoted 10% +2mph.

In spite of saying he wasn't sure how long he could talk for the meeting closed after an hour and a half. Thank you Phill for an informative talk.

New Rules Could Be Introduced To Reduce Roadworks Delays

New road rules could be launched to crack down on delays for motorists following a Transport Committee hearing in which experts called for urgent changes to be made.

Support has been growing in recent years for greater fines for utility companies to fix roads more quickly to keep traffic flowing, with calls for harsher consequences if streetworks cause prolonged disruption to roads.

Transport Secretary Heidi Alexander confirmed in January that the Government would strengthen rules for utility companies who "dig up roads without a permit or run well over time".

At present, gas, water, electricity and telecoms companies are slapped with fines worth £10,000 for every weekday that planned roadworks overrun, but this could soon be extended to include the same fines for weekends and bank holidays.

Research suggests that digging holes for utility works can leave a road damaged and vulnerable, and shortening the time it needs to be resurfaced by 17 per cent.

Speaking to the Transport Committee, AA head of roads policy Jack Cousens highlighted how a beer advert from the 1990s could help inform road policy moving forward.

The Heineken advert showed workers in a hole in the road, when gas workers drive past and ask to install a new pipe at the same time to prevent the hole from being patched and dug up again.

A second worker then drives past, asking to install a cable in the hole at the same time, followed by a telephone worker.

A Heineken van drives past with the "how refreshing" tagline, before multiple workers standing in the hole look in horror as a hearse drives past.

Cousens pointed out that the slapstick advert could actually offer a "glimmer of utopia" if all utility companies came together for the sake of motorists and road delays.

He said: "If we got the utility companies or indeed anybody who needs to get in that hole at that particular time to show that coordination and joined up thinking would improve the position for everyone.

"Be they road users, pedestrians, however they use our road network. That joined-up thinking is what's desperately needed."

There are also plans outlined by Heidi Alexander to give England's largest local authorities more autonomy over when roadworks can take place.

At present, local authorities need to apply to the Department for Transport to give the green light for a "lane rental" scheme, which charges utility firms up to £2,500 per day to set up roadworks.

However, under new proposals included in the Devolution Bill, England's 13 larger local authorities will be allowed to set up the "lane rental" schemes without input from the DfT.

The 2024 Autumn Budget outlined a nearly 50 per cent increase in funding for local roads maintenance.

Our Experience Of Owning An Electric Car

Last month I asked if anyone could write about their experiences with an electric car. Sally sent me this from one of her relatives.

Before buying an EV you should decide what you want from it and how you are going to charge the battery, public charging is very expensive, you may as well buy a petrol car!

We have 2 cars, a diesel Lexus and a second hand Nissan Leaf (Sparky) . He was 7 years old when we bought him with 4800 miles on the clock, and cost £8,000! The Lexus is handy for longer journeys and towing the caravan but 90% of our motoring is local and we argue about who drives Sparky! The Leaf is a joy to drive, responsive, quiet and has amazing acceleration up to and probably beyond the legal limit.

We do have solar panels but they were fitted by a cowboy company (now gone bust) and not much good, when the sun is shining in midsummer we get about half the power taken by the charger. I charge from a 3 pin plug, not a fast charger. I have to plan charging but didn't have to pay megabucks for a fast charger (which in my opinion doesn't do the battery any good) also I put a heavy duty switch in the system.

We get 3.8 miles per kilowatt hour, more in warmer weather, (about 6 pence per mile on standard electricity rates). We are looking into off peak electricity when we can get a smart meter fitted, then the cost could come down to about 2p per mile. Sparky is reliable, the garage complains there is nothing to do on the service so that's cheaper, we use an ordinary garage, mileage comes down in cold weather, and the down side is that we can only do about 100 miles on a charge, newer models are better but we did only pay £8,000. Great for local running and we simply charge overnight. We do 7,000 miles per annum on electric and 3,000 on diesel. Happy motoring.


