

### **Directions to the Carlton Social Club**

Main Street, Carlton, Wakefield WF3 3RW





From the M62 West leave at Junction 28 and take the A650 towards Wakefield. At the next set of traffic lights turn left onto the A654 toward Rothwell. Follow the A654, turning left in Thorpe on the Hill. Cross the A61 and continue into Carlton. Turn right into Stainton Lane then turn right into Main Street. The Social Club is on the right immediately after the Unicorn pub.

From the M62 East leave at junction 30 and take the A642 towards

Wakefield. Take the next right, B6135, towards Lofthouse. Follow the B6135 under the M62 onto Ouzlewell Green towards Carlton and Rothwell. Follow the road past Carlton Primary School and the Social Club is on the left just before the Unicorn pub.

There is a car park with overspill parking available on the grass area opposite the club.

## Blackout warning: Drivers must charge electric cars off-peak to avoid overstretching National Grid

Electric cars could cause "blackouts" if drivers don't charge them at night, MPs have warned as they recommended VAT cuts to help motorists switch over.

Ministers have been told the UK's power grid will come under increasing strain as more drivers buy electric, unless they are convinced to plug-in at off-peak times.

The Government has also been urged by MPs to prevent rural areas becoming electric vehicle "not spots" due to a lack of public charging points, and to make public charging as cheap as plugging in at home by reducing VAT.

Huw Merriman MP, and the chairman of the transport committee, said: "Unless the National Grid gains more capacity, consumer behaviour will have to alter so that charging takes place when supply can meet the additional demand. The alternative will be blackouts in parts of the country."

The calls come as the UK prepares to ban the sale of new petrol and diesel vehicles from 2030.

However, a report by the parliamentary transport select committee questioned whether government efforts to expand the country's charging network will be enough to cater for the millions of drivers expected to switch to electric in the coming years.

MPs warned the electric grid could need to be strengthened to cope with surging electric car use.

The National Grid has previously been bullish about the network's ability to cope over the coming years, arguing the improving sources of renewable energy will help meet the additional demand.

Last year, Graeme Cooper, the National Grid's transport decarbonisation director, said: "There is definitely enough energy and the grid can cope easily."

The company also argued that the development of smart charging – internet-connected electric car plugs that wait for off-peak times to charge the vehicle – would also help ease the strain on the grid.

Ministers are currently drawing up rules to mandate that all public charge points have smart charging.

A government report on smart charging earlier this year warned of the need for drivers to adopt the technology en masse as most motorists are expected to charge their cars at peak times, such as between 5pm and 7pm when they get home from work.

The paper warned that if smart charging doesn't take off, the UK's electricity grid will "require significant levels of additional investment" and that "the costs [will be] borne ultimately by consumers".

However, MPs said ministers should not rely solely on the take-up of smart charging to avoid electricity shortages and that they had to directly encourage drivers to avoid charging at peak times with schemes such as flexible tariffs.

The MPs' report also highlighted that some drivers are unable to charge at home and are paying more to charge at public points due to VAT.

The tax is charged at 20 per cent at public charge points compared to just five per cent for domestic charging.

The report said ministers should "address the discrepancy" so charging costs the same wherever drivers plugged in.

The committee also voiced concerns about rural areas being left behind in the rollout of the charging network.

Earlier this year, Grant Shapps, the Transport Secretary, said he aims to make charging an electric car as easy as filling up at a petrol station.

The Government is currently spending £1.3 billion on increasing charge points along motorways and A-roads as well as at homes, workplaces and on-street parking bays.

Yet, a study by the Competition and Markets Authority earlier this month showed areas such as Yorkshire and the Humber have a quarter of the number of charge points per head compared with London.

MPs said the Government needed to work with the National Grid to identify "weak areas" that need their infrastructure improving to ensure drivers in the countryside have access to public chargers.

Mr Merriman, a Conservative, added: "We also cannot have a repeat of the broadband and mobile 'not spot' lottery which would mean those in remote parts cannot join the electric vehicle revolution."

### Pathfinder Yorkshire August 2021

We were lucky to get five good days of weather for Pathfinder Yorkshire at Tockwith in August when fourteen teenagers with their parents came on the course to start their future driving in a safe and responsible fashion for their future.

Monday starts very gently getting to know where the controls are, especially the brake! They get the feel of moving the vehicle using clutch control whilst practising steering around a large oval area marked out with cones. Before long they are into second gear and can do a good emergency stop. By lunchtime most are away from the oval and onto practising reverse parking into a garage, a short slalom area and a longer section of road area with a roundabout.

Apart from learning to handle a car they are drip fed throughout the course about being responsible for their own and others safety whilst in a vehicle. Talks about peer pressure, speeding consequences and drugs are done in a way that gets their attention. Highway Code theory tests are taken every evening which they need to do and get a certain percentage correct to progress. We have them under the bonnet, checking tyre pressures etc. and by Friday they can confidently talk about cockpit and powdery checks.



We, the instructors, are dipping in and out of the cars throughout the week, talking through for example how to tackle a parallel park or a new road section. The road layout is changed most days adding more scenarios into the mix, even a motorway section with slip road, albeit short but helps to give a flavour of what's ahead once on the road. Every day they have instruction and then the parents take over with the practise.

Throughout the week we are talking/showing IPSGA into the sessions, hopefully there will be future members, who knows.

The next Pathfinder course will be at Tockwith on October 25th-29th. If you know of any young teenagers approx. 15-17 age please do pass on information about this course <a href="https://under17driver.co.uk">https://under17driver.co.uk</a>. Bursaries are available courtesy of MYAM.

### **Towing Test to be Abolished**

Since 1997 new licence holders have had to take a separate test before towing. This test is now being abolished. Full details are on the following website.

New rules for towing a trailer or caravan with a car from autumn 2021 - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)

To check if your licence covers you for towing look on the back of your licence for group BF.

### **Delays in Renewing Driving Licences**

There are currently delays of up to 10 weeks for paper applications for driving licence applications and renewals. Online applications have not been affected. If you are renewing your licence by post and nothing has changed you should be OK to continue driving but it would be an idea to make a copy of your documents before sending them off and to carry them with you.

### E10 Petrol

Do you know if your petrol car can run on the new E10 petrol? Cars built since 2011 should be compatible with the new fuel and many cars built earlier are also compatible. The following website can be used to check if E10 petrol can be used or if you'll have to use E5 petrol.

### **Road Tolls**

The treasury is facing a £40 billion hole in its finances due to the loss of revenue from Vehicle Excise Duty and fuel duty as the country transitions to electric vehicles. To combat this road pricing, which was comprehensively rejected under the previous Labour government, is being considered.

# Older Drivers fit, healthy and determined to keep driving for at least the next 12 years or more

New research from IAM RoadSmart, the UK's largest independent road safety charity, reveals that motorists over the age of 60 intend to drive for as long as they are safe to do so, and that the average age they would consider giving up their licence is 82.

With a grant from the Department for Transport, IAM RoadSmart recruited Dr Carol Hawley from the University of Warwick to produce an update on Keeping Older Drivers Safe and Mobile: A Survey of Older Drivers, first published in 2015.

The new report details the findings from surveying over 3,000 respondents aged 60 plus from across the UK, and highlights that older drivers value their cars to maintain independence and want to stay mobile for as long as possible while they are safe and able to do so.

Neil Greig, Policy & Research Director from IAM RoadSmart, commented: "There are over 12.1 million drivers of 60+ according to the report. With many being healthy, fit and with over 40 years' experience and knowledge, why shouldn't they continue to drive?"

**Dr Carol Hawley,** Author of the report said: "We recommend the Government should conduct a comprehensive review of the driver licensing and testing system in relation to the ever-growing number of drivers over the age of 70 and beyond. We need to ensure that those who are healthy, fit, and capable remain safely on the roads. Currently in the UK, the only safety requirement for mature drivers is to renew their driving licence at the age of 70 by confirming to the DVLA that they have no medical issues."

Overall drivers, asked in the survey, expected to continue driving for an average of 12.3 years.

- Drivers aged 60 69 years expected to continue driving for an average of 15 years.
- Drivers aged 70 and over expected to continue driving for an average of 9 years.
- The average age at which people think they will give up driving was 82.
- For drivers aged under 70 the average age for giving up was 79.4 and for drivers aged 70 and over the age of giving up was 85.3.

Figures on the number of drivers aged 60+ show there are now over 12 million (12,151,845) DVLA information at September 2020 shows: -

- The oldest valid licences are held by two men aged 107 and the oldest female is 106.
- There are 612,908 69-year-olds who will need to sign the self-declaration to say they are fit and healthy to continue the renewal of their driving licences next year.
- The over 70's make up 13% of all licence holders

80% of 70+ drivers have no plans to give up their licences yet according to our survey. Taking the statistics from the DVLA that could equal (4,344,542) individuals aged 70 or over with no plans to give up.

In our survey the majority (79%) felt they were excellent drivers and would not consider giving up for years. Only a doctor/GP or optician/optometrist, who are considered the most influential people to give advice on giving up driving, were likely to convince them to relinquish their licence for health or eyesight reasons.

Neil Greig continued: "We need a joint education campaign to help drivers start to plan for the retirement of their driving licences at an earlier age, working in partnership with the government, health professionals, pension advisors, financial advisors, and transportation experts."

"A wider range of easily accessible mature driver focused information is needed for consumers on accessible vehicle designs, mobility features, journey planning and mobility costs to help inform these campaigns. Mature driver reviews should be encouraged, and the government should consider the idea of offering them on prescription to encourage uptake and equal access."
