

MYAM Operational Area and Coverage




MYAM Operational Area







Revised MYAM Operational Structure

- CO role encompassed
 - Liaison with Associates before allocation to an Observer
 - Liaison between Observers and Associates once allocated
 - Observer Training (new and ongoing)
- Clear need to spread workload and avoid dependency on a single person
- Ken is Associate Liaison
- Chris to take on Observer Training
- Still need Chief Observer (liaison between Observers and Associates)
 - Use of Regional 'leads'?



New Observer Training



Trainee Observer Process

Group submits NO application via the DARTS portal

•Ensures Trainee Observer (TO) covered by insurance

Trainee Observer begins training programme

•12 months to complete training and final on-road assessment

Trainee Observer can operate independently when Group is happy they are competent to do so

•Safety will be maintained –operating under guidance from a mentor

When training is complete, Group to 'set candidate ready' via the DARTS portal

•Work with your ASDM especially when TOs are close to assessment



Submit an IMI NO Application Form

- Eligibility for Accreditation
- Compliance and Record-Keeping
- Tracking Progress and Performance
- Budgeting
- Phase-Out Planning



Test Ready - Trainee Observer

- 1. Navigate to Group Assessment in DARTS portal
- 2. Select the candidate by clicking on their **Candidate Order Line**.
- 3. The **Assessment Details** will appear on the righthand side.
- 4. In the **Contact** section, click the **Set Candidate Ready** button.

Notification is triggered for an ASDM to be allocated.

Referred Candidate

A Trainee or NO who has been unsuccessful in NO assessment Receive detailed report, outlining areas where they were unsuccessful. Reassessment must be completed within 3 months of the original assessment date.

Re-training and Re-assessment

- Follow development plan provided by the assessor
- Can continue conducting observations, but only under the group's supervision.

• Opt Out

- Choose not to retake the assessment
- No longer hold the title of Observer, nor insurance, so must cease all observing activities

Reassessment Booking

- There is a fee of £30 which is paid by the group.
- No need to submit a new IMI NO application via Darts

Masters

- Highest standard of civilian driving
- One-to-one mentoring
- Test outside of area on unfamiliar roads
- Will enhance and develop
 - Applying cornering principles
 - Assessing, planning and executing safe overtaking manoeuvres
 - Recognising opportunities to make safe progress (within the speed limits)
 - Improving observation, anticipation and awareness consistent with speed
 - Applying sound judgement of speed and distance
 - Delivering a fluent, relevant and continuous commentary
- Last for 5 years

Observed runs

- Number of runs
 - How long each run
 - How many is 'reasonable'
- When to do mid-term and pre-test assessments
- Decisions on ceasing Observed runs
 - Who / when / how communicate
- Experiences of Associates not wanting to take the test



Associate Test Report Feedback

Key development areas

- Progress making/maintaining /motorways, especially entry & exit speeds
- Blind spot & mirror checks junctions/roundabouts/motorway exits
- Spoken thoughts
- Cockpit Drill/Pre-Drive Checks/Vehicle Introduction
- Risk Assessment
- Steering correct pull push method if deployed
- Pre-emptive Gear Changes (manual & some automatics)



Observer Handbook

We are looking for desired outcomes and within reason are less concerned with inputs, if steering is safe and accurate at all times it is not broken so why do we need to fix it, a planned overlap at low speed as part of a systematic approach is more appropriate than a hurried attempt to separate brakes and gears which makes us rush into a hazard. If technology is available to make us all safer we need to understand it and use it to our advantage - but not rely on it – it should be the guardian angel that never has to step in but is always willing to watch just in case.

Static or moving Hazards

- Is the hazard 'stationary or moving'?
 - or has the ability to move
 - A moving hazard needs continual assessment as the scene unfolds
- Speed plays a major role in negotiating any type of hazard successfully and safely
 - can make or break how safe a driver is on the road



Speed and predicting


Speed into Hazards

- One of most important factors in developing a mindset of driver behavioural safety
- Often highlights those that are truly skilled at driving
- Choosing an appropriate speed is a fine art
- The difference in getting this right could be a just a few miles per hour
 - makes a huge difference to any outcome.
 - But safer to be slightly slower than slightly too fast.

Predicting and Compensating

- dealing with hazards and the unpredictability of some hazards we see everyday
 - if you see a pedestrian walking a dog, the job of the driver is to identify if the dog is on a lead or walking freely.







Sixth Sense

- Very useful when visually scanning to locate hazards
 - ahead, rearward and peripheral aspects
- Great skill to develop so you miss nothing
 - Aim eyes high and keep them moving acting as your scanning radar
 - Once you locate any hazard, immediately define what it is and what level of attention it requires
 - involves astute planning and predicting the outcome
 - keep assessing and reassessing
 - Make a plan but ALWAYS be flexible and make changes as and when necessary







Speeding into Hazards becomes 'Normal' Practice

- Nearly all drivers speed
 - Think this is acceptable behaviour an everyday occurrence
 - May be OK on certain roads and in certain driving environments
 - but over speeding habit becomes risky when meeting moving hazards and where drivers don't feel the need to lose enough speed and drive into high-risk hazardous situations too fast
 - Get your speed into hazards correct, so YOU look after the safety for yourself and other road users
 - It's an epic skill to develop and analyse your own performance and never that of others on the road



Example Run Sheet

Observer Comments

- Overall a good drive considering all items from course were being marked and tested.
- Most items were at or near to test standard whilst the key to changing these from a 2 to 1 score is to slow down actions, which will produce a smoother drive. A lot of well timed gear changes were executed.
- Excellent road positioning on right hand bends but practice taking an early line near white line for left hand bends if safe to do so.

Development Plan

Position for bends and other hazards, including parked cars, early to obtain as much information, allowing a plan to be created as soon as possible.
