



I thought it was an interesting evening, which was followed by a very informative talk by the recipient of our "Neil Atkins award" and Blood-Biker, Mr Neil Scarlett. The evening rounded-off with a very nice buffet, which was organised by our ladies, thank you, on the basis that a "trip to the pub" organised by the men might not be appropriate!

Whilst on the topic of "maintaining standards", is it me or are things such as patience, consideration and compliance with the laws of the road becoming rare attributes amongst some of the motoring population? I am sure that some of the good people of Telford drive cars which do not possess a directional indicator mechanism! If this is true, they are escaping to our locality as well. Why is it so difficult to indicate where you want to go and somehow "better" to go flying around islands and such like with all other road users wondering where these people are heading off to? Advanced driving skills, particularly observation and anticipation come to the fore here, as we try to "read" the other drivers intentions by a combination of speed, position and body-language to assess whether it is safe to proceed or not. I thought I would try to make some "safety rule comparisons", whilst my wife and I were on vacation in Cyprus a while ago. Here we go:



This image, taken from the "Stop line" at traffic lights, shows where the "locals" feel they should stop at a Red light. This position ensures that the driver can see if traffic is approaching on a Green light and if not, it must be safe to proceed, which they often do! Mind you, I also saw a Police vehicle do much the same, but I was <u>not</u> tempted to follow suit.





Here is a nice example of "the rules in theory and the rules in practice".

These chaps are 3 stories

up with no safety wear and no safety barriers, but maybe the concrete mixer offers a "soft landing" should all go pearshaped! They pass the safety requirements poster on the way into the site. All Greek to them it seems!

So, it seems in this small snapshot comparison, that we might not be quite as bad as we think in the UK when it comes to compliance with the law. But what is becoming clear is that where some drivers know the chances of en-

countering a camera or a Police Officer are slim, it can be a case that "the law does not apply to them" and in doing so, thoughtlessly ramp up the risk of an accident exponentially.

I am afraid that Advanced drivers complying with the laws of the road can face a challenging situation and it is not our place to enforce the law. If the speed limit is 30 and the driver behind is "up your bumper" as you "dawdle at 30 mph", you have to drive in an appropriate and calm manner, because if you miss something due to distraction and end up having to brake sharply, the following vehicle is likely to become one with yours. Giving them time and space to get past, with little thanks of course, can also be a solution. There is no "selectivity" possible if we are to maintain our driving standards and enviable safety record as members of the IAM. People who break the laws of the road are in the wrong, but it is a pity sometimes there is no one around to catch them doing wrong.

Around two thirds of UK road users would support a scrappage scheme for older diesel cars, vans and lorries in an effort to get the worst polluting vehicles off our roads, according to a survey by IAM RoadSmart.

The survey asked respondents to rate the various options put forward in the government's recent nitrogen dioxide consultation but found that only 3% of respondents are confident that the proposed measures solve the problem quickly.

Some 64% of those surveyed said they supported a diesel scrappage scheme, compared to 27% who did not. Most wanted any scheme to apply to cars over eight years old. Some 83% of those surveyed by IAM RoadSmart agreed with the government's view retro-fitting buses, coaches, HGVs, vans and black cabs with new equipment should be the priority.

However those surveyed felt the driver as an individual also has a responsibility to drive in a more eco-friendly manner. Some 75% agreed that encouraging drivers to change their driving behaviour should play a part in the government's approach to tackling air quality.

Sarah Sillars, IAM RoadSmart Chief Executive Officer, said: "It is clear to me that the public at large feel the government needs to be decisive and proactive when it comes to making our air quality better. They see strong government direction as key to making sure it happens.

"We must not forget that drivers themselves have a part to play in the way they drive – it is within the power of each of us to become better and more eco-friendly driver and our responsibility to do so." She added: "It is however clear that the car manufacturers have some way to go to rebuild trust with the public - it would seem that only when their environmental claims more closely match real world performance that the trust will be on the increase. Reputations take years to build and moments to fall." "We must not forget that drivers themselves have a part to play in the way they drive – it is within the power of each of us to become better and more eco-friendly driver and our responsibility to do so."

After the completion of its 'Get Into The Driving Seat' recruitment competition, IAM RoadSmart has announced that David Gallagher will be its next Younger Driver Ambassador for 2017/18.

David, 23, from Sedgley near Wolverhampton, triumphed in the closely fought contest, which saw him and a number of other finalists get a grilling from a team of judges that included the 1992 Formula 1 World Champion Nigel Mansell, IAM RoadSmart Chief Executive Officer Sarah Sillars, and founder of First Car magazine James Evans.

David follows in the footsteps of Eloise Peabody-Rolf, who has successfully held the position of Younger Driver Ambassador from last September to August 2017. The Younger Driver Ambassador is a high-profile position with the successful candidate becoming the voice of younger drivers nationwide. In his new role David will take on a variety of responsibilities including lobbying for change within the organisation, travelling up and down the country visiting schools and colleges, and working with the charity's 200+ groups throughout the UK as they look to attract younger drivers to the IAM RoadSmart community.

David's car credentials go back a long way. He learnt to drive unofficially age 11 on private land and confesses to being into 'anything with an engine' including ride-on lawnmowers! Passing his driving test first time age 17, David became involved in his local IAM RoadSmart group in Wolverhampton, rapidly becoming their young driver representative. He also took the Advanced Driving Test and achieved a F1RST standard.

Since leaving school David has held a variety of jobs including assistant to club photographer and groundsman at West Bromwich Albion and swimming coach at Bilston Swimming Club. Now with six years of driving experience without a single incident, David now drives a Skoda Superb.

Philippa and I had a very nice day at the Morgan Car visit and thank you very much for your part in organising it. The guide (Derek) was exceptional as he spoke for almost 2 hours without any significant pause! He made it very interesting and for my part I hadn't expected so much information about what is basically a very small product. He drew our attention to some of the detailed methods of manufacture and mentioned the choice of materials used. The ash wood frame I think is unique, beautifully made but all covered up with aluminium or leather during the assembly. One cannot fail to be impressed by the quality craftsmanship and care that was apparent going into every car.

The business was referred to as a Global Car manufacturer as 80% of the cars are for overseas client. Of the 5 different versions of motor car made I think I might be right to say that 400 are completed every year.

We passed a showroom on the way out and our guide Derek asked me to sit in one to try it. I resisted the temptation as having done the tour I would love to own one. But I don't have a garage which means I would have to park it in the sitting room!

As you all know we have been struggling to get our trainee observers moving along for their qualifications. Also we have a few of us who need to re qualify or move onto becoming National Observers. Sundays are hectic and requires us to double up etc. Doubling up is not a bad thing as we learn from each other, but we are restricted re observer training at times.

I have been talking to the committee of the Curborough Sprint Course which is located not far from Fradley. They have 8 Breakfast Meeting during the year which run from April to Boxing Day. I have now got agreement for us to use their future Breakfast Meeting to do Observer Training from.

The Breakfast Meetings are from 8.30am to 11.30am and for the rest of the year are on the following dates: Saturdays August 12th, September 9th, October 7th. So, please make a note of the dates. We can use them for the observer training demo drives and hopefully we can also get some associates along for extra drives and use those for trainee observed drives. Also any observers who would like to do any training including those already doing the National training are welcome to come along. There is a mobile burger bar serving breakfasts and drinks and the site has toilets. There will be a gathering of motoring enthusiasts to chat to and also see what is taking place on the circuit.

We will be positioned on the right as you go into the circuit and if I am there before you then there will be a feather flag to mark the meeting place. Don't go right into the main area we have agreed to stay near to the entrance so we can go in and out as we please. You can of course wander down to the main area to see what goes on and chat to people it is just that we can drive in and out easier if parked near the entrance / exit point. If you want to go on these training days please let me know and for trainees what you would like to achieve so that I can hopefully find associates.

Associates if you want to take the opportunity of an extra drive and also give our trainee observers a chance to become qualified then please keep me informed. You will need rear seats as one of our Local Observer Assessors will need to sit in the back to supervise the drive. You also of course have the opportunity of two feedbacks so it has got to be worth doing.


Trainee Observers and Drive Bookings

Those of you who attend the drives and talks at the hall will know that we are currently getting all of our current observers up to the new IAM RoadSmart certification. Also we have five trainee observers who are working their way through the IMI standards required to achieve the nationally recognised qualification of a Local Observer. Some of the National Observers are also due for requalification via the IMI and IAM RoadSmart examiners. All of this training is done within our group and poor Pat Round our associate drive coordinator and the other ladies on the desk have a lot to sort out on drives at Fradley. It reminds me of a Michael Caine quote, "Be like a duck. Calm on the surface, but always paddling like the dickens underneath." Well done Pat and the desk ladies.

We aim to give our Associates priority at the Fradley drives. This of course has the knock on effect that it takes longer to get more observers qualified. Associates you can help! Our trainee observers are not allowed to take Associates out without the guidance of one of our four Local Observer Assessors (LOA's) sitting in the back. If you are willing for this to happen then please mention this when booking drives at Fradley. Also should you arrange an observed drive with one of our four LOA's then please mention to them that you are willing for them to try and get a trainee observer to take you out and for them to sit in the back of your car. This has a benefit for you as you will get the feedback from the Trainee Observer and also further guidance if necessary from the LOA in the back. Our four LOA's are Peter Thomas, John Russell, Nigel Rogers and myself.

In order to plan the Fradley hall based drives it is important that the drives are pre booked via Pat Round. Pat can be contacted by email at pat@lamm.org.uk Remember, if you do not book then we cannot guarantee a drive at Fradley hall. We may need to double up for some drives due to availability of our volunteer observers. Associates have found this "Buddy" system to be both enjoyable and a way of progressing quicker by learning from each other and exchanging information. It is advisable to have rear seats otherwise someone will get cold and damp sitting on the roof! Again if this might be an option for you then please mention to Pat when booking for Fradley hall. We cannot guarantee these options as it all comes down to availability at the time of the drives, but it may help relieve a stressful planning operation.

Some of our observers living in the extreme edges of our group struggle for drives away from the hall so please consider trying to involve them if possible. Examples are Steve Hunter from Baswich, Stafford and David Korzonek at Cannock.




Tip for Associates

Our group has a high guality standard of observers who are keen to help associates progress through their courses. In order for associates to take advantage of the observers guidance I would encourage associates to please remember that once you finish your observed drive it is up to you to maintain and practice your new skills every time you go on the road in between drives. We sometimes get the odd associate returning on observed drives who we know have not done that and it means starting from scratch again. We are different to driving schools who teach you and you need to use their car. We give you advice on what you need to do and you already have a car so you can go and practice that. When you have sorted it out, or if you cannot sort something out and need further guidance on that topic then it's time for another observed drive to move on.
